Proposition 55 - State School Bond

- Provides our kids with clean, safe classrooms to improve student learning and help our children succeed.
- Invests in our kids and their future by providing funds to repair classrooms and build new schools.
- Targets funds where they're needed most– severely overcrowded classrooms, outdated schools in need of repairs and fast-growing communities that need schools.
- Provides strict accountability standards that guarantee school bond funds will go directly to repair and build new classrooms—not spent on bureaucracy and waste.

Proposition 56 - Budget Accountability Act

- Holds legislators accountable for passing the state budget on time. Lawmakers won't get paid their salary, per diem, expense and car allowance for each day the budget is late.
- Requires the Legislature to stay in session until the state budget is passed.
- Reforms the state budget process and ends legislative gridlock by changing the votes required to adopt the state budgets from two-thirds to 55%.
- Requires fiscal responsibility by establishing a mandatory reserve fund of a least 5% so that extreme budget cuts and tax increases will be less likely in a weak economy.

Proposition 57 - Economic Recovery Bond

 Protects our public schools from future devastating cuts. Prop 57 is a one-time bond of \$15 billion that will be used to pay past deficits at time when interest rates are very low.

Proposition 58 - Balanced Budget Act

- Prevents the state from spending more than its revenues and prohibits future borrowing to finance state budget deficits.
- Creates a rainy day savings account that will be used to pay off the state budget bonds early and builds a cushion for any future economic downturns.
